We foster artistic exploration, experimentation, and research in music to benefit the wider society. Our faculty-led performance initiatives and interdisciplinary projects push boundaries in music performance and scholarship.

With state-of-the-art facilities, we encourage musicians to explore the possibilities of composition, performance, and production. We partner with leading consultants, reputable arts organisations and local communities, delivering unique career-building opportunities and a direct route to the music industry.

We enable musicians to discover their professional identity and gain hands-on experience. We also help our alumni develop entrepreneurial skills and build a fulfilling professional portfolio. An example is our Accelerate scheme, which supports graduates each year with a new creative project, social enterprise, or business idea or to take an existing initiative to the next level.

ACCESS

Widening access to music education and learning opportunities is fundamental to our vision. The RCM is deeply committed to supporting students from lower socio-economic backgrounds, ensuring they have access to high-quality musical education and opportunities to excel in classical music.

We act as the bridge and connector for young musicians, especially those who face inequality of opportunity due to their geographical or financial situation. We convene local and international communities through concerts, masterclasses, and education programmes. We have partnerships with schools, arts organisations, community centres, and other charitable organisations, providing access to music education for all.

We do this through our Junior Programmes. Since 1926, the Royal College of Music Junior Department (RCMJD) has offered advanced musical training to talented young musicians between the ages of 8 and 18. Our learning and participation programme, RCM Sparks, has provided inclusive opportunities for young people to engage in music education since 2007.

We offer informal and engaging music education and participation to families, schools, community centres, and people of all ages and abilities. Our high-quality performances, events, talks, and exhibitions invite everyone to explore and enjoy music online and in person.

Our Access and Participation Plan outlines several key strategies to address the barriers faced by students from low-income households. These initiatives are designed to improve access, participation, and success in conservatoire education, with a particular focus on those from disadvantaged backgrounds. We ensure our students have the financial support and access to the necessary instruments.

OUTSTANDING OPPORTUNITIES

We are immensely proud of the career development opportunities we offer our students. We emphasise the need for students to be well-rounded, confident, and versatile communicators in their professional engagements and beyond. We have a vibrant research culture that promotes curiosity and innovation to advanced doctoral level and our students can create bespoke courses to suit their aspirations.

Our graduates are highly employable. The Higher Education Statistics Agency graduate employment survey showed that an impressive 90% of RCM graduates from our 2020-21 cohort were employed or further study fifteen months after graduating. This percentage was captured at a challenging time for arts sector employability.

We provide the ideal environment for our graduates to become industry leaders, change-makers, and entrepreneurs. The RCM's Creative Careers Centre (CCC) is recognised internationally for its innovative approach to supporting young musicians. We are also the only UK conservatoire with this dedicated career service that supports students and graduates for up to five years after graduation. We offer resources, guidance, funding opportunities, bespoke career advice, coaching, mentoring, online workshops, and presentations by industry specialists. We also provide professional opportunities, including performances and teaching work.



The CCC partners with leading consultants, reputable arts organisations, and local communities, delivering unique career-building opportunities and a direct route to the music industry.

Described at its foundation as an institution whose doors were to be 'thrown open to the whole world', the Royal College of Music is an international and diverse community. We work together to create and sustain a community where diversity is recognised, valued and celebrated. We are pro-active in advancing equality and inclusive practice in our staff and student recruitment and admissions processes, in our research activity, in our teaching and our artistic programme, and the College's working environment.

We will endeavour through effective and collaborative action to create a culture which values diversity, and in which students, staff and visitors give due respect to other people and their work or ideas.

"We formed our quartet 'officially' at the RCM in September 2001. We had been playing together already, for external engagements, and we knew we had a great chemistry, musically and personally. At the end of our first year together, we won the Intercollegiate String Quartet Prize, and that really set us off on this wonderful and crazy path that we're still navigating. As RCM Quartet in Association, we run a chamber ensemble project each year, performing once in College and then again shortly afterwards in our own festival in Folkestone. Working with RCM string players is a great pleasure and often a very moving experience, and these concerts have been some of the most thrilling and rewarding of our career."

"The best part of my RCM learning experience was working with other musicians and recording my compositions, which helped develop my skills as a composer for screen. I wouldn't previously have had the confidence to host my own recording session, but now I've published my works and recorded them with orchestras. This is all thanks to my wonderful professors, who taught me so much – I wouldn't be where I am today without their help. I work on games and films with studios and companies such as High Rollers DnD, ZM Films, Omnivore Games, The Storyteller Squad, The Writer's Room: 7th Sea, and The Gods Fabled: Soil Frontier. I've been nominated for and won a few awards since graduating, including the Cannes World Film Festival and Best Music Composer at the Tokyo Film Awards. I conducted at the Netflix Queen Charlotte Orchestra pop-up concert in 2023 and have recorded with the Budapest Scoring Orchestra, all while working as a part-time teacher, music arranger and producer."

"The Royal College of Music is a very special place to me. It is where I first heard masterclasses given by incredible musicians such as Sir Andrés Schiff and Maxim Vengerov – they were nothing short of inspiring. The RCM's prestigious and illustrious Keyboard Faculty, and the chance to study with Professor Vanessa Latache, were among the reasons I wanted to attend. I completed my Masters and Artist Diploma in Performance in 2023, by which time my career was already developing thanks to winning the Leeds Piano Competition. It led to performances at Wigmore Hall and in South Korea, Germany, France, Spain, Poland, and Kazakhstan. I also had the pleasure of performing with the RCM Symphony Orchestra and Sir Antonio Pappano in January 2022. At the 2023 BBC Proms I was asked at the last moment to perform Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto no 2 – the RCM had prepared me mentally and musically to be ready to say yes to such an opportunity."

WHY YOUR SUPPORT MATTERS

Your support provides critical income for our charitable mission. Tuition fees and government funding are insufficient to cover the cost of excellence in music education, with a funding gap of approximately £2,000 per student. To run our full talent, innovation, and access programme, we must raise £6 million each year from private philanthropy, corporate partnerships, and venue hire.

At the same time, we still feel the impact of the pandemic. We have made savings without compromising the student experience, including deferring capital investments and limiting discretionary spending. Nevertheless, these savings cannot fully compensate for lost income.

Despite this, and thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we remain committed to talent, innovation, and access at the highest level. This has been recognised with consistent accolades, including:

- Global No. 1 institution for Performing Arts 2022, 2023 and 2024, and inaugural No. 1 for Music in the 2024 QS World University Rankings by Subject
- No. 1 in the 2022/23 and 2023/24 and People & Planet University League table for universities with fewer than 5,000 students, the only comprehensive and independent league table of UK universities ranked by environmental and ethical performance
- RCM teaching acknowledged as 'Outstanding,' achieving a Gold ranking in the Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) 2023.

MAKE AN IMPACT

Your contribution nurtures talent by providing scholarships and performance opportunities, drives innovation with pioneering projects and research, and expands access to world-class education for all. The Royal College of Music provides a high return on investment (ROI) on donated income. A 2019 Institute of Fundraising benchmark found that the voluntary sector's average ROI is £3.37 per £1 invested.

We are proud that our 3-year rolling ROI is £4.47 per £1 invested (2022–2023), which reflects our relationship-based fundraising. We have a robust gift acceptance policy, and 100% of all fundraising goes directly to the cause.

He will be working across the College and with supporters and alumni on the revised strategy in 2027 to outline the way forward for the future of music and RCM's continued resilience and growth.
