Away Santiana is a famous and popular sea shanty that is sung all over the British Isles. A sea shanty is a type of work song that was once commonly sung to accompany work on board large merchant sailing ships - a maritime work song. A sea shanty typically has a Caller who sings a few lines as a solo and then the audience or the rest of the ensemble answer them.

- How long did the journey take?
- Who went on the journey?
